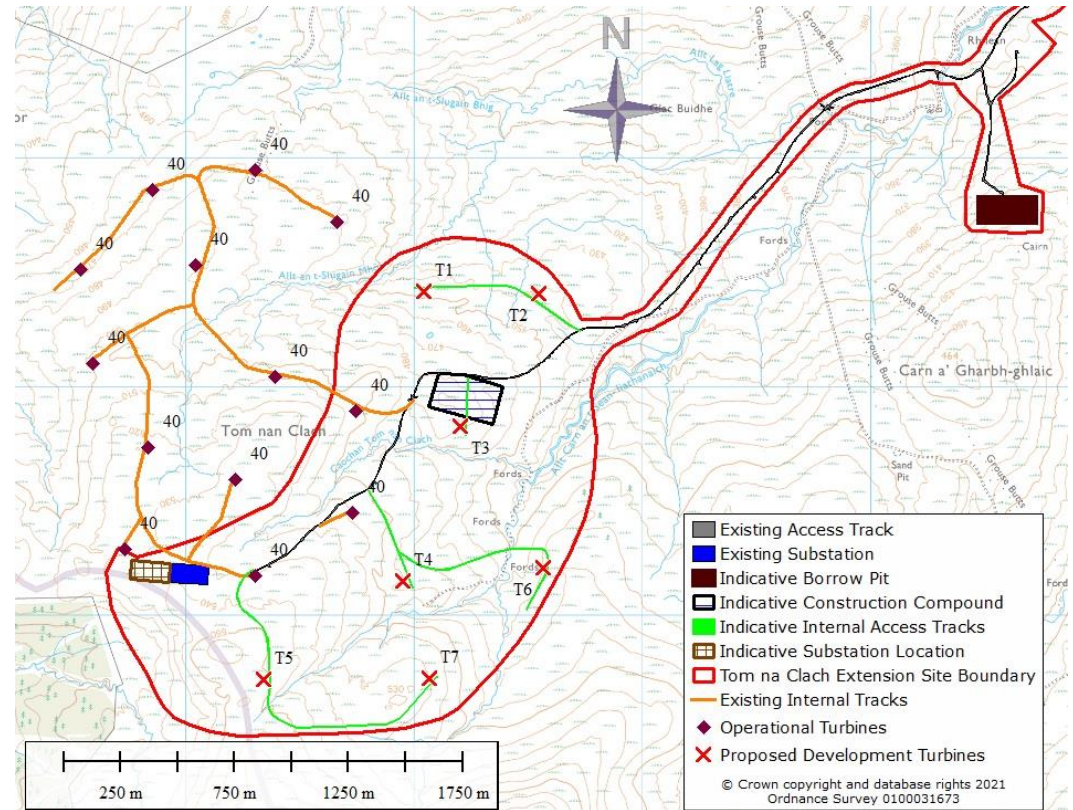


Overview of the proposed plans

- The proposal is for up to 7 turbines which will form an Extension to the existing, operational Tom nan Clach Wind Farm.
- The capacity of the turbines is yet to be confirmed, but will likely contribute around an additional 30MW to the existing operational windfarm.
- At present there are various turbine models that suit this site. New and updated models matching the proposed dimensions will also be considered.
- The proposed turbines have a maximum tip height of 149.9m when one of the blades is in a vertical position.
- Keeping turbine tip heights under 150m means there is no requirement for visible aviation lighting.
- The proposed Extension will utilise the existing access track and reopen the borrow pit used for operational wind farm, reducing environmental impacts.

What's in a name?

The original development was named Tom nan Clach, a name taken from the Ordnance Survey map, visible above. 'Tom' is a small peak or knoll and 'nan' in Gaelic means 'if' which is clearly meaningless as part of a place name but was somehow adopted by the cartographer of the day. This time around, we have rectified that mistake and have named the Extension project **Tom na Clach**.
